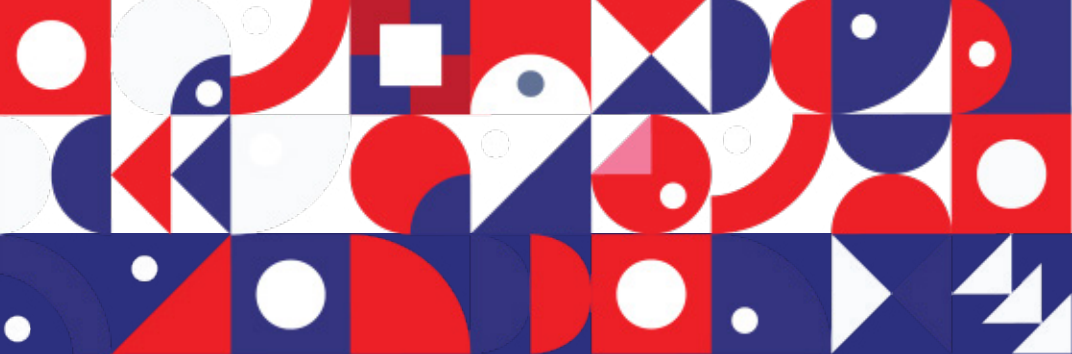

GMD'S STATEMENT



Since our inception in 1983, Society for Family Health (SFH) has been driven by the mission to improve the health outcomes of vulnerable populations across Nigeria and beyond. As one of Africa's leading not-for-profit public health and social enterprise organisations, we remain committed to delivering impactful healthcare interventions, building sustainable health systems, and advancing the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

In line with our commitment to the UN Global Compact, SFH continues to align its strategies with the 10 UNGC principles, focusing on human rights, labour, environment, and anti-corruption. Guided by our 2024-2030 beyond boundaries Strategy, SFH continues to work towards Universal Health Coverage, strengthen our workforce, and build resilient health ecosystems across the countries in which we operate.

This reporting period has also seen SFH deepen its evolution into an integrated Group structure, comprising specialised entities spanning donor-funded public health

programming, health insurance and managed care, pharmaceutical supply chains, advisory and professional services, and public health training. This transformation strengthens our capacity to respond to Africa's most pressing health challenges with greater agility, innovation, and long-term sustainability, while keeping the wellbeing of the people we serve at the centre of everything we do.

Between January 2024 and June 2026, our programmes distributed over 20.6 million insecticide-treated nets, trained more than 172,000 healthcare workers, community pharmacists and Patent and Proprietary Medicine Vendors (PPMVs), and reached over 4.8 million individuals with life-saving health messages, products and services. We also supported 314 Primary Healthcare Centers, diagnosed 817 active TB cases, and reached over 19,600 orphans and vulnerable children with essential support, reinforcing our contribution to SDG 3 (Good Health and Well-being) and the broader UNGC principles.

We reaffirm our dedication to these principles and to fostering sustainable development in the communities we serve. Our progress over the reporting period, outlined in this report, reflects our commitment to a healthier, more equitable world for all.

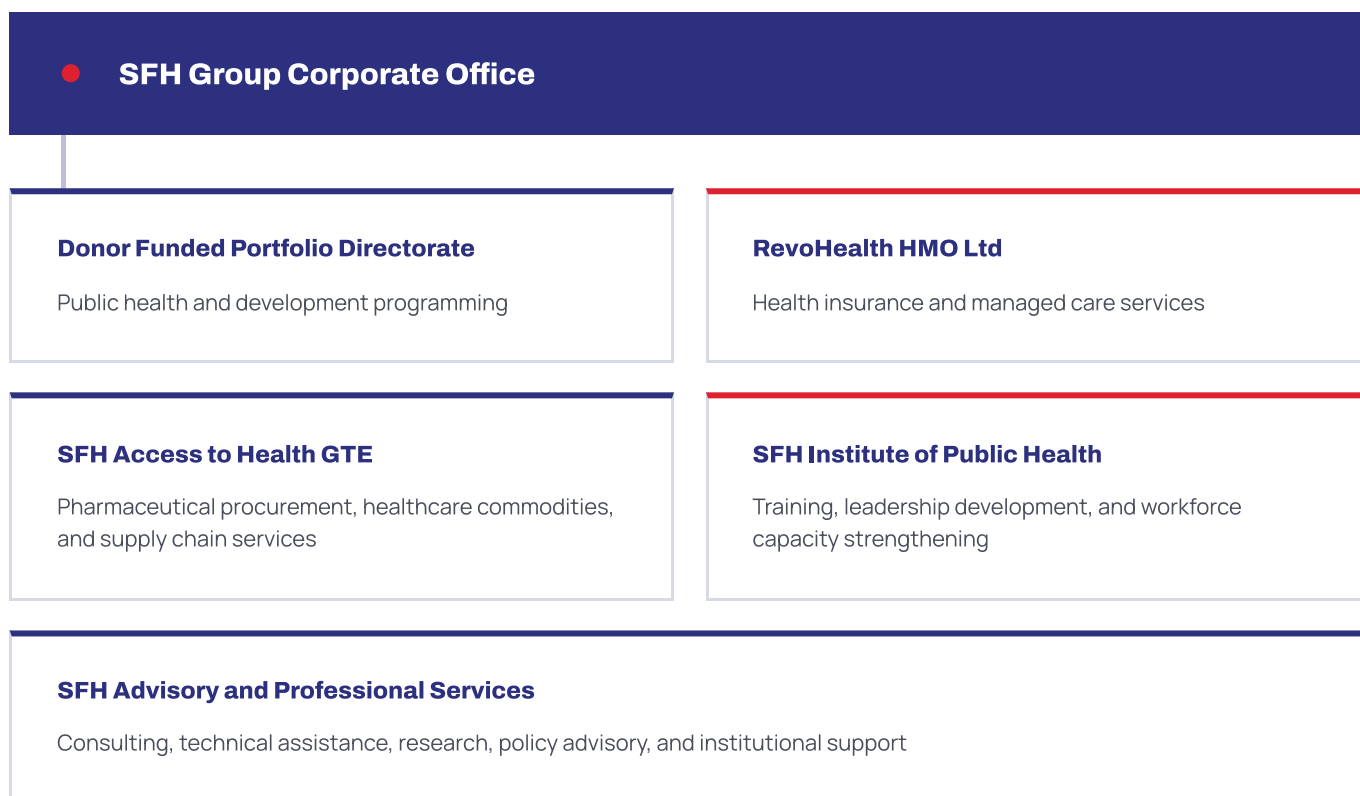

SECTION 07

ENVIRONMENT

SFH's environmental policy demonstrates our commitment to SDG 13 (Climate Action). Our approach focuses on:

01

Carbon Emission Reduction

SFH continues to reduce its carbon footprint through energy-efficient practices and the promotion of renewable energy in its operations.

02

Water Stewardship and Pollution Control

SFH, in partnership with the Nigerian government and with funding from Procter & Gamble (P&G), has continued to expand access to clean water and improved sanitation under the WASH for Healthy Lives (W4HL) project. Since the project's inception in 2021, SFH has driven community behaviour-change efforts on safe water, hygiene, and sanitation practices across high-risk communities in Nasarawa and Edo States, before extending support to include solar-powered and motorised boreholes in response to identified community water needs reflecting the organisation's continued commitment to water stewardship and pollution control in line with UNGC Principles 7–9.

Waste Management

SFH maintains protocols for managing waste, including recycling initiatives and reducing paper use by transitioning to digital platforms. As part of these efforts, SFH introduced colour-coded waste bags across its facilities to support proper waste segregation at source, separating general, recyclable, and hazardous or medical waste for appropriate handling and disposal. Compliance with this system is actively enforced across facilities, reinforcing safer waste management practices and reducing environmental and public health risks associated with improper waste disposal.
